Touching Others Discipleship:

We met on a cold, rainy day. He held out his arms, dripping wet from under his garbage bag raincoat. Now Tony is my friend. Tony is homeless, but he doesn't think of himself as homeless because he "dwells with the Lord." Tony has thinning red hair and ruddy complexion from being outdoors. He has a cleft palate and missing teeth. He loves the Lord and knows the Bible by heart. Tony speaks in scriptures and songs.

People come into our church daily needing something. Tony, on the other hand, loves to give. Not many homeless people bring me food, but he does. He has brought a breakfast taco, a cup of instant soup, and

a container of shelled pecans. He brought a box of tea once so that when he comes in he doesn't have to borrow. I help him buy things he needs. He knows exactly how much his needs cost, and thrift store bargains enable him to meet needs of others. He loves to fish. I've helped buy two fishing poles that he gave away so someone else could eat. He probably shares his favorite fishing secrets, too.

Tony has taught me many things. We had a hard time communicating at first. He would say one thing, and I would repeat what I thought he

said until I understood. Sometimes he writes words to shorten our conversations. I've learned to listen more intentionally.

Tony loves to draw. He draws pictures on restaurant napkins. He paints vibrant colored flowers on poster board when he has money to buy art supplies. Most pictures display a Bible verse or his favorite hymn. He even repainted our old nativity scene.


Once when Tony came, he wanted a vacation to the gulf. We went to the Greyhound bus station and purchased a round trip ticket. Think how long most of us take to make vacation plans—not Tony. With ticket in hand he turned around and got in line—no bags, nothing extra except what he was wearing. He would stay on the beach or at a local shelter at night, and cook fish on an open fire. He has complete trust and isn't anxious about anything.

Tony attends the Wednesday night service sometimes. One devotional theme was "street people." It is different when you ask a homeless person what another street person really needs. Tony answered, "First of all, you don't judge. You don't know the reason for the person's condition." After a pause he finished, "Smoked

> salmon! I'd give them a can of smoked salmon. No matter what, I will always give them something."

A professor once said that evangelism is "one beggar telling another beggar where to find bread." Tony shares his bread wherever he goes.

Here's What's Working for . . .

Presbytery del Cristo is so spread out geographically, with churches from Texas to California, that the Congregational Care Committee decided to keep in touch with each congregation between meetings of presbytery. Our committee serves as the link between the congregation and presbytery.

This committee is responsible for the care of the congregations. We send notices and notes of encouragement to congregations approximately every other month. Each member of the committee also serves as a prayer partner with one or more congregations. We have asked congregations to add us to their online prayer links and to put us on the mailing lists for their newsletter and emails to help us stay connected and informed.

In the future we hope to offer educational opportunities for people who attend presbytery. The training opportunities would be available on Thursday afternoon before presbytery begins that evening.

First CPC, Austin, TX—The session approved "elder on call." One elder per month serves as a contact for anyone with concerns. This action will provide everyone with another person to contact in case of emergency or other church news. The elder on call is in addition to the pastor, church office, and shepherd elder.

Jackson CPC, **Jackson**, **TN**—Following a fellowship meal, teams comprised of Sunday school classes participated in "Are You Smarter Than a Sunday School 5th Grader" Bible challenge. Prizes were awarded to the team who answered the most questions correctly.

Milan CPC, **Milan**, **TN**—Junior and Senior High young people are learning how to manage money based on Christian principles.

New Salem CPC, Lakeland, TN—Needs & Deeds is a type of "Christian Classifieds" where people can advertise for items or services that they need from or are willing to provide to members of the community. Items or services may be for sale or given freely.

St. Matthew CPC, **Burleson**, **TX**—Online giving is available to those who are interested in this time-saving method. Utilizing your debit card or electronic funds transfer, you can tithe online or make a tax-deductible donation. It is safe, simple, and convenient!

Greeneville CPC, Greeneville, TN—After reading N. Grahm Standish's book Becoming a Blessed Church, the session embraced the idea of having "a Year of Prayer."

Pastor Jamie Lively has preached several sermons on prayer and the emphasis will continue throughout the year. The session has set aside time for prayer and has divided lists of church members to pray for every week. Each church committee has been asked to make special time for prayer during their meetings. Three prayer groups met during the Lenten season and one continues to meet. Plans are being made for a prayer retreat and a youth prayer group to begin this fall. We have made books and Sunday school material on prayer available for those interested in further study.

Dyersburg *CPC*, **Dyersburg**, **TN**—There is a new wind blowing in relation to congregational care in our church. After months of preparation and prayer, the Session established four new *Congregational Care Ministry Teams*.

Communications Team: will develop ways to stay in touch with members of the congregation who may be going through trying times by utilizing such avenues as cards, phone calls, emails, visits, prayer chain, etc.

Helping Hands Team: will be comprised of those in the church who are skilled in minor home maintenance who wish to use those gifts to assist those in the congregation who have "special needs." This care team will also be involved in supplying transportation for members who are unable to drive when they need to run errands or visit their doctor.

Special Care Team: with appropriate training will be assigned to provide Christian care for members of our congregation who are experiencing bereavement, terminal illness, divorce, grief, or hospital care.

Shepherding Team: will be sensitive to those in our congregation who are in nursing homes, assisted living facilities, and those with limited mobility. This team will also target those who are convalescing from surgery.

Donelson CPC, Nashville, TN—Families in the congregation provide and deliver Meals-to-Go for members who are unable to leave their homes. Those persons who deliver the meals stay and visit with the homebound member.

Responding through Service

Going to the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in South Dakota was probably one of the most amazing trips of my life. I went with a group of people from our church, whom I got to know on a whole new level. Living with people for a week, sleeping in the same teepee-shaped sanctuary, eating meals together, working with them in VBS, and celebrating communion on a butte really establishes a connection!

One of our projects was to hold VBS for the children and youth who live on the reservation. About fifty Lakota Indian children participated, which was double the number from last year. It was such a blessing to have some of the same kids two years in a row and to see how they've grown up.

Just a few facts about the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation today:

- Population: 46,000 Lakota people. One half of the population is under the age of 18;
- Unemployment: 73-85%;
- Per Capita Income: \$6,143;
- Life Expectancy: male 55 (US avg. 75)/female 60 (US avg. 80);
- Infant Mortality Rate: 2.6 times the national average;
- Suicide Rate: 72% higher than the national average;
- Diabetic Rate: 37% of the population is diabetic;
- Alcoholism: 4 million cans of beer a year (average of 10,958 per day) are sold just one mile from the border of the Pine Ridge Reservation in White Clay, Nebraska, where the population is 14 (yes...14);
- Children in Poverty: 69% of the children live in poverty.

Helping these children find hope, getting to know them on a personal level, showing them that there are people who love them and who want to help them is why the trip means so much to me. These children



need to see that they are not forgotten. They don't think they matter, and I want more than anything to prove to them that they do. The drive there may not always be the most entertaining, some of the stops may be boring, some of the evening speakers may be boring, the sleeping arrangements are not always ideal, it may not make sense...but as soon as you look into the faces. into the eyes of those

children, nothing else matters. You know you're in the right place.

Recently, I had the privilege of serving God in Nueva Laredo, Mexico, on a mission trip there to help build dormitories for future mission trip goers as God is at work in the CP Church there. We accomplished quite a bit during the time we were there. But all that was accomplished was through God because the act of serving is an act of God's grace.



In order to serve, I had to step out of my comfort zone. I have a very narrow area of comfort. First of all, I don't like to be hot for even a moment and I like the comfort and privacy of my own home. I rarely do manual labor and I prefer staying inside in the coolness of my air conditioning. So why would I want to go to Mexico in 106 degree temperature with no air conditioning to paint walls and haul tiles.

As I was there doing what God had asked me to do, I received a gift. That gift was the realization that Jesus stepped way out of his comfort zone for us so that we could have his grace and forgiveness.

I was there to share what I had and that was my time and money. And I hoped to receive the satisfaction of giving, but I received so much more. While there, I felt I was in continual worship of God and he was blessing me moment by moment. I felt a sense of purpose in my life that wasn't temporary like the world is, but was eternal in its purpose. The comforts of home seemed terribly insignificant in comparison.

God has our work in Mexico covered. God is doing great things there and prospering the efforts of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church for our Hispanic brothers and sisters. It is our individual hands that do the work but it is God's hand that brings about a great harvest for his eternal glory. I am thankful to have been used by God for his eternal purposes—sweat and all.
